3.	Housing & Homelessness Update	Danielle
	 D. Neilson provided a housing & homelessness update from St. Thomas- 	
	Elgin Social Services:	

- We have welcomed a new City Manager to the City of St. Thomas.
 Sandra Datars Bere brings with her lots of experience in Social
 Services. We wish our exiting City Manager, Wendell Graves, all the best in his retirement.
- To date, we have not received word that our CHPI allotment will be increasing or decreasing for 2022. We are moving forward with the knowledge that it is remaining the same. This has been approved by City Council.
- We have been advised that SSRF (the COVID relief funding) will be ending on March 31st, 2022.
- We have rolled out a new social housing application. It is fillable, AODA compliant and available online. Next, we will be turning our attention to our HeLP program. This program is to aid individuals who are in a rent or utility crisis that could result in homelessness.
- We are working on a definition of someone who is engaging in transitional housing support. We are in conversation with transitional housing providers, our Built for Zero coach and those with lived experience. By our next meeting, we hope to have a draft definition that we can share with this team as an advisory group.
- It has become evident that our community is lacking resources for ID replacement. There is a meeting set for later this month to find solutions in bringing this resource to our community.

4. Community Updates

- <u>By-Name List</u> V. Beneteau provided an overview of the by-name list for the month of December:
 - 10 new names added (3 male/8 female). 3 of these names completed paper readiness
 - 9 adults moved from unhoused to housed status
 - As of January 2022, 79 people are experiencing chronic homelessness with 100 active homeless individuals on the list
 - V. Beneteau also provided a yearly wrap-up of 2021 indicating that there were 189 referrals to the by-name list with 84 individuals who were housed.

- <u>Women, Youth and Family Homelessness</u> V. Beneteau provided an update on behalf of the Women and Family Homelessness Committee:
 - Art project shared Reflection of past, present and future through art. Will create one collaborative final art piece from each woman's individual art.

- We are looking for individuals with lived experience that are experiencing stability and wellness and are willing to participate in our advisory group- Send Referrals to Dawn (dbailey@ywcaste.ca)
- Our Annual Housing & Homelessness Symposium planning is underway, and we are hoping to host in May (in person). We look forward to sharing more information as the planning progresses.
- The INN L. Fitzgerald provided an update on the INN:
 - Today marks our third week at 10 Princess Street and we are starting to get into the flow of the new location and setup.
 - For the first time ever, we have been at capacity almost every night and are happy to see individuals who never visited us before. At the new shelter we have both a men's and women's dorm, along with a flex space.
 - We are hoping to soon add case management to allow for more one on one interactions with our guests. CMHA has an office located in the shelter and has been onsite daily. We also receive frequent visits from the MOST team and CCHC.
- WECHC T. Dale provided an update from WECHC:
 - We have been working on getting a small shelter up and running in the West. We will be partnering with St. Mary's Church as they will open their doors starting on Friday. We also have a small space available for a family. This will be piloted until the end of March.
 - It has been confirmed that we now have stable funding for a Rural Systems Navigator.
- Other Updates D. Neilson provided an update on behalf of Indwell:

	 Since the Railway City Lofts have opened, police calls have dropped by 82% regarding their participants. Indwell is really starting to see an increase in stability in everyone who is living there. 	
	 Indwell's second building on Queen Street is well underway. This will be a medium support building. A third, low support building is planned for Ross Street. The idea is that tenants will be able to flow through the buildings as they are ready. If a tenant decides to not move to another Indwell building, their program at the Railway City Lofts will be able to connect them with different types of supports in the community in general. 	
5.	Lost Lives Working Group Update	Danielle,
	 The group has not formally met yet – the next step is for the group to come together. We do know that this is a gap in our community, and we are looking at what they do in London. In London it is more about getting together and recognizing lost lives rather than getting it perfect. 	Valerie, Tanya & Leticia
	 We all agree that we want for this sub-committee to be action-oriented ahead of taking time to write policies. SBEC has identified the Horton Market as a location where people can gather and recognize lost lives. If someone wants to organize an opportunity, we have the space. N. Bond can advise on what a service would look like while recognizing that not everyone would have a spiritual or faith-based background. The group previously discussed the need for a monument. SBEC has also identified a couple of locations that could work. They can't provide the locations yet but said that they are easy to get to and would be noticeable. SBEC also recommended an artist for the monument and potentially has two donors. 	
6.	 Training and Information Requests Would like to create a staff and guest post-trauma response if ever needed. Any ideas are welcome on how we can bring this support into the community. The group discussed having different members and organizations provide a presentation to our group each meeting. The goal will be to gain insights into local housing and homelessness prevention projects in the community. 	Danielle & All










- 3 adults completed Paper Readiness and were referred to Coordinated Access




Referrals






History of Homelessness












